Woods spoke of the practice of gold dredging both in California and Alaska. He then took up the description of the dredge itself and explained its working principles. Dredges are expensive affairs, costing above \$300,000. As an idea of some of the details making up this enormous bill, the buckets that convey the auriferous gravel to the screens are provided with manganese steel lips. These lips cost about \$50.00 apiece, and as the dredge has 90 buckets, this alone makes a respectable item.
