FRESHMAN CLASS WINS MEET

From Athletes Representing Portland
And Eugene High Schools.
One Record Broken.

From start to finish of the triangular meet on Friday the Oregon freshmen were ahead. At one time Portland cut down the lead to three points, but the next event widened the gap. Every man of the Portland and Eugene teams acquitted himself creditably, but they could not do much against the cream of last year's graduates from the preparatory schools of the state. The athletes of the class of 1911 showed that they will be a valuable addition to the teams of the University in future years. Harry Moon, late of Drain Normal School, delighted his many admiring classmates by winning the three dashes and finishing the relay in thrilling style. "Chuck" Taylor, onetime hero of H. M. A. showed that he is University material by winning two firsts and two seconds. Sam May made a good captain; he won the 440 and took second in the half mile. C. A. Downs, late of P. H. S., ran a gallant half mile, and Sievers the little freshman from Parkplace won the mile by a lead of half a lap. Hoover took second in the mile by a game struggle with Jamison and O'Leary. Wind and a wet track and field made the time slow and made jumping difficult. At one time rain stopped the meet for a few minutes. For P. H. S., McGuire and Latourette were stars, showing especial ability in the hurdles. Ellmaker, captain of the Eugene team, won their only first, but his team-mates all put up a game fight. COLLEGE HOUR WEDNESDAY

The occasion was the College Hour, a custom which prevails at many universities throughout the country and which, with the gathering Wednesday, was inaugurated at the University of Oregon we hope, to remain.
