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JAMES K. LYMAN LECTURES

To the Young Men's Christian Association Last Friday Evening
On "Temptations."

James K. Lyman, student secretary for Oregon, spoke at Y. M. C. A., taking his text from the story of the temptations in the fourth chapter of Matthew. Mr. Lyman said in part:

"Up until the time of this event, the tempting, Christ probably had not realized his divine mission. He had seen travellers from all over the known world, had studied law and history and realized that, if that history was true, the Jews had a message for the world. Then when the vision came and he realized that he was a second lawgiver, he, like Moses, went into the wilderness. There he was tempted. He looked out in his mind over the whole world, and the temptations that he resisted had a world-wide significance. He had determined to do the will of God, and he found that possible only when in close personal relation to God.

"Here is our lesson. As University students, we must get this relationship if we are to be effective. In national, in state, and in city government the great problems can only be overcome by divine aid. As Christ looked over his nation, so we as privileged men, look over ours, and the solution which he found needful is indispensable to our success. If we have the right personal relation to God, we cannot but succeed, and we will find most difficulties are but barriers divinely appointed for the development of our latent powers."
