He spoke of the founding of the first Medical Mission in China, and the subsequent founding of hospitals, schools and colleges. Methods of taking the Gospel of Jesus Christ are changing. Those who are doing the work have come to realize that by giving men and women the things they need, they can open the way for the more distinctive work of evangelization.

The work of Dr. Grenfell in Labrador was also touched upon. This great man has won the love of the people and there is not one who would not die for him. And then he spoke of the work in the United States of the Home Mission Boards and of philanthropists.

"The missionaries both at home and abroad are helping to lessen the physical suffering of humanity; they are educating the people and helping them in all their needs. Christ himself used this same principle. He helped those who were sick, and the love behind it all made itself felt. The idea in missions, in all life work is to help people in their actual needs."
