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## TWO TRACK MEETS ARE WON

### Oregon Runners, Jumpers and Weight Handlers Defeat Whitman and Washington State College

Manager Bean, Trainer Hayward and the fourteen athletes comprising the University of Oregon Track Team returned home Sunday from their trip into the Inland Empire, and they brought with them trophies of two victories. They left on their trip last Monday and on Wednesday defeated Whitman College by a score of 75 to 47 and on Saturday Washington State College by the score of 62 to 60. In the Whitman meet the runners and jumpers were in fine form and their performance exceeded anything which Hayward had hoped for. Huston demonstrated his speed by covering the 100 yd. course in 10 seconds, defeating Martin, the missionaries' crack sprinter. Captain Kuykendall won the 120 hurdles in 16 flat and made a broad jump of 22 ft. 5 inches. Sievers, the doughty little Freshman runner lowered the college record in the mile by winning that event in 4:40. Dodson also broke a college record by covering the half mile in 2:02 2-5. Other surprises of the day were the winning of the high jump by Moullen and Lowell's work in the 440. He won the race defeating Reid, who was thought to be without a peer in this event in the Northwest. Zacharias showed something of his old time form in the hammer throw, while Moullen surprised many by picking up four points in the weights.

Discus throw—Philbrook (W) first, Dutcher (W) second, Zacharias (O) third; distance 100 feet 3 inches.

120 yd. hurdles—Kuykendall (O)

first, Philbrook (W) second, Huston (O) third; time 16 seconds fiat.

220 yd. dash—Martin (W) first, Moon (O) second, Reid (O) third; time 21 4-5 seconds.

Shot put—Philbrook (W) first, Moullen (O) second, Zacharias (O) third; distance 40 feet 1 1-2 inch.

High jump—Moullen (O) first, Philbrook (W) second, Foster (W) third; height 5 feet 3 3-4 inches.

440 dash—Lowell (O) first, Reid (O) second, Barners (W) third; time 2:52 1-5.

Broad jump—Kuykendall (O) first, Martin (W) second, Lewis (W) third; distance 22 feet 5 inches.

Hammer throw—Zacharias (O) first Gardner (O) second, Moullen (O) third; distance 141 feet.

220 hurdles—Roberts (O) first, Martin (W) second, Philbrook (W) third; time 26.

Mile run—Sievers (O) first, Downs (O) second, Mays (O) third; time 4:40

Relay—Whitman won. Oregon entered all her weight men, Moullen, Zacharias, Gardner and McIntyre.

Final score—Oregon 75, Whitman 47.

The team stayed in Walla Walla until Friday, when they left for Pullman. The meet with W. S. C. was hardly as satisfactory as the one with Whitman as several of the men had not recovered from the gruelling work of Wednesday. Rain fell during the meet and the Oregon distance runner's were unable to make any creditable showing.

However several good records were made. Huston again ran the 100 in ten flat and Kuykendall the high hurdles in 16. Kuykendall also beat his Whitman jump two inches, making 22 feet 7 inches, which, aside from Kelly's performances, is the best jump made in the Northwest for several years. Roberts, the Freshman sprinter and hurdler, sprung the surprise of the day when he won the 220 yd. dash in 22 1-5 seconds. He also took second in the 100 and third in 220 hurdles.

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## PRESIDENT KERR OF O. A. C.

### Addressed the Students of the University and the Grangers on Last Wednesday

One of the most interesting Assemblies of this year, was held Wednesday in Villard Hall. Dean Sanderson read a portion of the Scriptures, followed by an earnest and impressive invocation. Hon. S. H. Friendly and Pres. Campbell each gave a short address of welcome to the visiting Grangers who were last week holding their state convention in Eugene, including a concise summary of the situation as it stands, in reference to the appropriation bill. Miss Alberta Campbell favored the Assembly with an instrumental solo in her inimitable manner, after which the speaker of the day was introduced—Pres. Kerr, from the Oregon Agricultural College. Pres. Kerr is a splendid speaker—interesting, and clear, with a fine delivery. His address was upon cooperation between the neighboring Universities, between State colleges and Universities and among the lower schools—public, normal and high.

"The two main requisites for the development of educational work in the United States are—First, that we should carry the opportunity of education to the doors of everyone. And secondly, the educational system must be adapted to the particular needs of the individual. In the development of the country, the girls must be educated for their life work, as well as the men. We demand men and women of sterling worth, but the demand is too great because there are not enough technically trained for it."

Among the Grangers, a few were called upon for speeches. President-elect Dunston emphasized Pres. Kerr's statement concerning the need of honest manhood and womanhood and enlarged upon that point. State Lecturer Mrs. Clara Waldo, of O. A. C. attempted to prove the superiority of

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
