

STUDENT BODY ELECTIONS

Held Last Wednesday—New Officers Will Take Office on Monday, June 8.

Three hundred and twenty-nine students voted at the student body election last Wednesday, the largest vote ever polled at an Oregon student body election. Never was more interest taken in the annual event than was manifested last Wednesday.

In all cases where more than one candidate was in the field, the competition was exceedingly close, showing that all students voting took enough interest to have a decided preference either one way or the other. Thos. R. Townsend, '09, was elected president by the small margin of thirty-five votes. LeRoy Wood, '09, was elected vice-president. Nieta Harding, '09, was chosen secretary. Harvard Moore, '09, and Ormond Bean, '09, were elected to the positions of members at large on the executive committee.
