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## BOND WINS FIRST PLACE

### In Seventh Interstate Oratorical Contest Held at Seattle Saturday Evening

With the memory of the Oregon victory on the track to spur him on, Jesse H. Bond, representative of the University of Oregon in the seventh annual interstate oratorical contest, completed a day of honors for his Alma Mater, Saturday night at Seattle by winning first place over Herman Allen of the University of Washington and William K. Gwin of the University of Idaho. His oration was on "The Evolution of Character," and it was the excellence of his delivery of a masterful theme that won for him the coveted honor. Mr. Allen of Washington won second place, receiving but one point less than Mr. Bond. The latter received two second places and one third on thought and composition and three firsts on delivery while the former got three first places on thought and composition and one second and two thirds on delivery. As winner Mr. Bond was awarded a prize of \$75.00 by the King County Bar Association and Mr. Allen received \$25.00 for second place.

Saturday night's contest marked the second victory for Oregon during the seven years in which the tri-state league has existed.

The contest next year will be held in Moscow, Idaho. The chairman of the contest Saturday night was James P. Hartman of Seattle. The judges on thought and composition were President S. B. L. Penrose of Whitman College; Prof. Norman Coleman of Whitman College and Prof. B. Baldwin of Oregon Agricultural College. The judges on delivery were Judge C. H. Hanford of the United States circuit court; F. G. Dorety and Dr. J. H. Powers of Seattle.

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## VICTORIOUS SEASON CLOSED

### At Seattle Saturday Afternoon When Oregon Track Team Emerged Victorious

By a big enough score to have won a dual meet, Oregon defeated Idaho and Washington on track and field Saturday at Seattle, and remains undisputed champion of the Northwest for the third consecutive time. The Oregon team, which was feared to have been badly weakened by the loss of Moores, has thus demonstrated its own ability and that of Bill Hayward. Oregon won 64 points, Idaho 35, Washington 23. Many of Idaho's points were made by the phenomenal Edmondson, who won the quarter, the half-mile, the mile, and a lap in the relay. The track was slow and no records were made.

Huston, Moon, and Roberts won the hundred in one, two, three order; Moon captured the 220 with ease. Kuykendall won the high hurdles and the broad jump and tied with Moullen for second in the high jump and the pole vault. The three places in the shot went to Moullen, Zacharias and McIntire. Zacharias won the hammer throw. The detailed events follow:
