

TWO MORE GAMES ARE WON

Roseburg and Multnomah Teams are Beaten—Oregon Defeated Monday

Two lively games with M. A. A. C. at Portland on Saturday closed the varsity baseball season. The first game was Multnomah's, 2 to 0; the second fell to Oregon, 4 to 1. Fred DeNeffe, a former Michigan balltisser, pitched the first game for Multnomah, holding the collegians down to two hits. DeNeffe was well supported by such stars as Stott and Murphy of Stanford, Huiscamp, of Yale, Dick Jones of P. A., and McClellan and Camp, the famous infield combination. The Oregon men made few errors. Clark stopped a speedy grounder putting a man out by a hard throw to first. Dick Hathaway went into the
