UNIVERSITY SUMMER SCHOOL

Will Open for Students on Monday,
June 22—Special Courses Will
be Offered

The University Summer School opens on Monday, June 22, thus giving the students a chance to attend the commencement exercises.

The principal object of the Summer school is to advance the general education of the people of the state and also to give the public school teachers an opportunity for advancement. There are no formal requirements for admission except that the student has sufficient preparation to be able to profit by the work.

Courses will be offered in the following subjects: Botany, Chemistry, Physical Geography, Education, English Literature, History, Mathematics, Modern Languages, including German, French and Spanish, Philosophy and Physics.

Credit will be given for the work provided it satisfies the department and an examination is passed at the end of the course.

The following members of the faculty will be in charge. Biology, Prof. Sweetser and Miss Kent; Chemistry, Prof. Shinn; Education, Prof. Sheldon; English Literature, Prof. Howe, Miss Williams; French and Spanish, Prof. Cloran; German, Dr. F. F. G. Schmidt; History, Prof. Clarke, Mathematics, Prof. DeCou; Physics, Prof. Boynton, Mr. Jackson.

The expenses of the Summer School are very small. A fee of \$10.00 is charged at registration. Room and board can be secured for from \$3.50 to \$4.00 per week.

All the large eastern colleges and universities are conducting most important summer sessions which are giving many persons a chance to get specialized work of help to them in their vocations. These summer sessions are especially well attended by teachers who wish to broaden their education, but do not desire to spend the school year in study.

The summer school of the University of Oregon is particularly to help Oregon teachers who feel the need of advanced work, but cannot take a full University course.

When the first session of Summer School was held, the attendance was small, but it has grown steadily since, and for this year promises a very good attendance.
