## NEW MEMBERS FOR FACULTY

Teaching Force of the University has Been Increased in Several of the Departments.

Increase in the size and scope of the University has necessitated the addition of several new members to the faculty. All the new instructors are of recognized ability and some have attained to considerable prominence.

Prof. James D. Barnett will have charge of the department of Political Science. A student majoring in this department hereafter will have completed the first year of a law course when he receives his degree. Many new courses are offered this semester. Professor Barnett has his degree of Ph. D. from the University of Wisconsin, where he was assistant instructor under Professor Ely for two years. For three years past he has been at the University of Oklahoma. When the recent political trouble scattered the best members of the Oklahoma faculty to new positions, Oregon was fortunate in securing Dr. Barnett.

L. R. Alderman, Oregon, '98, is assistant professor of Education and has charge of the Correspondence work. He was formerly County Superintendent of Yamhill County, and later at the head of the Eugene schools. He is president of the Alumni Association and an active worker for the University.

Professor F. R. Frink, who will have charge of Railroad Engineering and Bridge Building, graduated from Michigan in 1886. Since, he has taught as assistant and full professor at the Universities of Illinois and Idaho. He has had much practical experience, and will greatly extend the scope of the work of this department.

Hugo Koehler is instructor in German. German by birth, a graduate of Syracuse, 1903, and student at Leipzig, 1903-4, he has taught in Iowa University and Seattle High School.

James A. Currie, M. A., comes from the University of Indiana where he was an instructor last year. He ranks here as instructor in Chemistry.

R. C. Clark, Ph. D., Wisconsin, who took the place of Dr. Schafer last year, while the latter was absent in Europe, will remain in the History department as assistant professor.

Miss Bertha Slater will be succeeded as instructor in English by Mary H. Perkins, A. B., Bates, A. M., Radcliffe. She has had several years of successful experience.

Prof. A. C. Terrill will be succeeded in the department of Mining Engineering by Prof. F. L. Barker, A. B., Colgate, E. M., Colorado School of Mines. He has been mine superintendent and expert and has taught five years.

Sam Elliott, Oxford scholar, will assist in Psychology and Public Speaking. He will be intimately connected with the literary societies and with the work in debate and oratory.

Mrs. Ellen M. Pennell comes from Monmouth Normal to be assistant dean of women.

M. H. Douglas is the new librarian. He is a graduate of the library school

of Wisconsin University, and has been librarian at Iowa College.

Miss Mozelle Hair, '08, will assist in English Literature and Miss Miriam Van Waters, '08, will help in the Correspondence courses.

## FOOTBALL SQUAD IS WORKING

Depleted Ranks Must be Recruited From new Material, as Many Veterans are Gone.

Prospects for a victorious football season for the University are at the present time neither brilliant nor discouraging.

While Oregon lost a number of stars by graduation and ineligibility and failure to return to college, including Moores, Kuykendall, Zacharias, Arnspiger, Taylor, Scott, Coleman and Grout, yet it is thought that an average eleven can be built up around the remaining stars out of the material in the scrub and freshman teams.

The squad is the largest in the history of the University, numbering about fifty candidates. Also indications are that the new system of coaches this year is ahead of any scheme of this kind so far tried in the annals of Oregon football.

The members of last year's team who have returned to college include Captain Moulten, '09; McIntyre, '09; Clark, '10; Pinkham, '10, and Voight, '10.

Coach Forbes has not put the men through any scrimmage work, but will begin that feature the first of this week. Among the new men who are showing up well are Main and Michel from Lick High School, San Francisco; and Latourette. Gilles, ex-'10, who played on the varsity year before last, has returned to college and will make a valuable addition to the squad.

Assistant Coach Arnspiger, '09, has charge of the freshman squad which is made up of at least thirty players. Manager McEwen has had Kincaid Field covered with sawdust so that regular practice can be indulged in without too much risk of injury to players.
