### I. B. Rhodes Talks.

Ivan B. Rhodes, state secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association, spoke to a meeting of men at Deady Hall on Thursday evening, presenting the matter of Bible Study. He made a strong appeal to the men present to include a bible class in their course of study, not only for the literary knowledge to be gained, but even more for the spiritual experience to be derived. During the present week the association will follow up the movement started by Mr. Rhodes, and will give every man in the University a chance and an invitation to join a class in the study of the scriptures. Eight courses are being offered, some of them being led by prominent members of the University faculty as President Campbell and Dr. Schafer.
