DeCou at Laureans

"The Value of the Literary Society" was the subject upon which Professor DeCou delivered an interesting and valuable address to the Laurean literary society Saturday night.

He said: "Although the regular courses of study are the objects which have a primary claim upon the student's attention, yet there are other activities of college life which he can not afford to neglect. The best friendships of life are formed during college days. The men that have made themselves most distinguished in life after leaving college are those who in attendance there were the best known and most active in student affairs. The literary society is one of the most valuable of student enterprises. A man to be fully educated must master to some extent the art of speaking in public assemblies.

"The literary society supplies an opportunity which is not to be found in the class room. The work in these societies is not compulsory, but the student in order to get results from it should labor as faithfully as he would in his regular classes."
