VARSIETY TWICE VICTORIOUS

First Team Defeats McArthur's Alumni Aggregation—Freshmen Beat Portland High School

Such were the entirely satisfactory scores of the football games held Saturday on Kincaid Field. A better game has seldom been witnessed in Eugene than the contest between Varsity and Alumni. Eight of the eleven men on McArthur's team of "grads" were in their day, all-northwest players. Every man was an individual star in his particular position, and exhibitions of impromptu team work given at times which startled the opposing team. The Alumni worked together splendidly and fumbled only

OFFICIAL RULES ANNOUNCED

The Dean of Women has Established Rules to Govern the Conduct of Women of the University

Printed copies of a set of rules to govern the conduct of the women of the University of Oregon have been distributed by Professor Luella Clay Carson, Dean of Women. The rules are ten in number and appear in full below. They are headed "General University Regulations," with the sub-head, "The following regulations shall be in force for women of the University unless under special permission." Several, though not all, of the sororities have formally accepted the rules. Some of the rules coincide closely with custom and existing sorority house-rules, while others have not hitherto been

The place kick that won the game for the undergraduates was made late in the second half. Twice before place-kicks had been attempted and had failed. In the second half the Alumni, who were near the east goal, punted to get out of danger. Clark heeled a fair catch, and Moullen kicked from placement on the thirty yard line, the

formally prescribed by or for any sorority. The first rule applies to the Mary Spiller House, and the others to all members of the University, wherever they may reside. This is the first time that an attempt has been made to enforce definite and absolute rules of conduct among Oregon co-eds. The rules follow:

1. The Mary Spiller House shall not be open to callers on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings.
- (All sororities have made such a regulation.)
2. Calls may be received on afternoons between three and five-thirty.
3. The doors shall be closed at ten o'clock.
4. No house-parties shall be given except on Friday and Saturday nights and nights preceding holidays and such parties shall end by 11:30.
