6. Women of the University who wish to ride, drive, or walk out of town, or go in boats on the mill-race or river should make suitable arrangements; also any who wish to dine in public hotels.

7. Parties going on picnics or outings should be accompanied by a chaperon.

8. Any woman desiring to leave town should get permission from the Dean of Women before going.

9. Any woman desiring to move from her rooming or boarding place should consult the Dean of Women before moving.

The University desires that no student be encouraged to move, during a semester, from her rooming and boarding place (providing they be comfortable and wholesome) into any other home, sorority, or boarding place, unless

BARRETT TALKS IN VILLARD

Director of Bureau of American Republics Offers Facts of Interest in Pleasing Address

"What the Pacific Ocean has in Store for Oregon" was the topic discussed by Hon. John Barrett, Director of the Bureau of American Republics, in Villard Hall last Wednesday evening. Mr. Barrett spent his early manhood in Oregon and has the liveliest interest in the University. He congratulated the students upon the splendid work they are doing and said that the future of our country depends largely upon Western college men as the influence of wealth has caused degeneration of the Eastern type.

Mr. Barrett emphasized with telling figures the immensity of the oriental empires and the necessity of our understanding them in order to get their commerce and to hold our own against them. He then discussed Central and South America, presenting some startling facts with regard to the size, wealth and culture of the various countries. He closed with an appeal for a better understanding of our Latin American neighbors, expressing his hope for a conference of all the republics that border on the Pacific.
