M. A. Kees of the Portland Y. M. C. A. gave an address on the subject of Missions before the University Association on Friday night. Mr. Kees leaves in January to take up the work of a missionary in China and is full of his subject. He spoke in part as follows:

"The world has always been groping after God but all in vain until Christ the first missionary appeared. He has been the great factor in the making of civilization since that time. Under the influence of his religion the Anglo-Saxon race has risen from a barbarous condition to lead the world. In order to understand history we must make a study of Christian missions. Paul did more in Rome than any Caesar. Livingstone did more in Africa than did Cecil Rhodes. Thus missionaries have been of the utmost importance in the progress of the world.

"Today, China is the great undeveloped field of the world. She is in need of a great religious awakening and when that comes she will rise to a position of power among nations. The call to that field is strong and the answer must be made by the young men of America."
