

Plan to Have Student Organization and Boost as a Unit at all Games

Oscar Furuset, University of Oregon '08, who is at present attending Oregon Law School at Portland, writes interestingly concerning the school.

At present there are 105 students enrolled, of which number 53 are freshmen, 30 are juniors and 22 are seniors. In the freshman class there are four Oregon graduates, D. E. Hardin, '07, John C. Veatch, '07, Gordon C. Moores, '08, and Oscar Furuset, '08. Among the students are graduates from Edinburgh University, Christian Brothers College, of Memphis, Tennessee, University of Oklahoma, and Oscott College, of Birmingham, England.

Sessions are held at night in order that they may be attended by men who have employment during the day. Many of the students have work in law offices and thus have the advantage of being in touch with attorneys on questions which arise. The school is especially favored in having under its observation the courts of Portland, which include all courts excepting the United States and the state supreme courts. The law library of Multnomah county is also open to the school.

The lecturers are prominent attorneys in Portland. These attorneys are not actuated by any pecuniary inducement, but generously take up the work because they are willing to make a sacrifice in order that the law students of Oregon may receive the best of instruction.

Each class has its debating society which meets once a week. The school will hold a joint debate with the University of Washington College of Law this winter.

It is a hard matter in a night school to arouse much college spirit in the sense in which it exists in most universities and colleges, because most of the men are busy during the day. However the classes have organized and a student body organization will soon be effected in order that the school may have a unit representation at games held in Portland. The students will attend in a body the game against O. A. C. on November 21.
