Whitworth's thirty yard line. The score was now ten all and the Oregon rooters felt relieved.

Whitworth kicked off to Oregon and the ball went over the line. It was brought out to the twenty-five yard line and Dudley Clarke punted to Whitworth. Then ensued one of the prettiest runs ever witnessed on the Oregon field. Catching the ball on Whitworth's forty-five yard line, the fleet Colbert, dodging and whirling, ran straight through the entire Oregon team for a touchdown.

The Varsity players seemed utterly unable to down the twisting half-back and his run will go down as a memorable feat in the annals of Northwest football. Oregon supporters were strongly reminded by this play of the great run which Kuykendall, '08, made in the Idaho-Oregon game of last year. Goal was kicked by Colbert, who put up a very clever game for the Washingtonians.

Oregon was in striking distance of Whitworth's goal several times before the close of the game, but seemed unable to pierce the line when yardage was necessary. Twice they had the ball on the Presbyterians ten yard mark but the line of the Northerners was seemingly impregnable to the Oregon attacks. The whistle blew with the ball in Oregon's possession on Whitworth's forty-five yard line.

During the game the Varsity executed several pretty forward passes, but many more of these were broken up by the Whitworth ends, who had no trouble getting to Oregon's backs. Clarke did not punt up to his usual standard and the Tacoma punter, McQuillen, took the honors in this department. As a whole, it was brilliant teamwork which beat the Varsity, and this was sadly lacking in the lemon-yellow eleven. The Whitworth players were all stars while the men doing the best work for Oregon were Michel,

Means, Hayes, Main, Chandler, Captain Moulten and Dodson.

## PRES. CAMPBELL AT Y. M. C. A.

### Talks on the Reasonable Basis of Christianity to Large Body of Students

Particularly interesting and instructive was the meeting of the Y. M. C. A. last Friday evening at which President Campbell gave a splendid talk upon the Reasonable Basis of Christianity. He said in part:

"In obedience to the law of transition from one extreme to another the world has, after centuries of complete faith, swung rather to the opposite extreme of agnosticism. It is thought by many that belief in God and religion is but a matter of blind faith and emotion, without reason. But such is far from being the case. There are many questions of life upon which we cannot know all of the facts and our conclusions must necessarily be guided by faith. To all of the questions of life Christianity has given a fair and square answer.

"Take for instance some of the questions of philosophy. Shall we interpret the immense in terms of matter or of spirit? Are the material things we see around us ultimate or is there not some spiritual power behind all? Christianity answers it fairly and definitely. 'In the beginning, God created heaven and earth.'

"Again the philosopher asks, 'What is God? Is he a living, thinking God, or does the higher power consist only of the abstract unfeeling laws of the universe?' Christianity answers that God is a definite personality.

"And then it is inquired 'Of what disposition is God toward man?' Christianity answers that God is kind, for whenever we obey the laws of God, happiness is invariably the result.

"In each of these instances the answer of Christianity is completely satisfying at once to the reason and to the heart. And an acceptance of these answers of Christianity, a belief in God, his personality and his kind disposition toward man is the only attitude that will give us confidence in the world and in ourselves.

"Conceding that there is a God with beneficent intentions toward mankind, is it not reasonable to suppose that he would manifest that kindness by trying to uplift humanity by means of Divine Revelation? Jesus Christ is the great Revelation. In the central miracle of his life, the Resurrection, he has held out to men the hope of a future existence. And in his teachings he has given the one great formula that will solve all our difficulties, love to God and love to man."
