WASHINGTON WINS BIG GAME

Washington a chance at a place kick, which failed. A drop kick a moment later was also unsuccessful. After the kick-out, Washington failed to make yardage, essayed another place kick, which Chandler ran back. Clarke kicked, Pinkham and Main kept Washington from making yardage, Means getting the ball on a fumble. Oregon gained on interchange of punts during the rest of the half, because the entire Oregon line would be upon the runner before he could advance far after catching one of Clarke's high spirals. Pinkham solved the fake buck through tackle every time it was attempted. Clarke prevented a safety, when punting out from behind the line, by his cool handling of a high pass. Alleged roughness by Pinkham cost Oregon a heavy penalty, but the Washington captain, in a spirit of rare sportsmanship, allowed the Oregon tackle to remain in the game. The half closed without score.

The Second Half.

Both teams came back hard, Washington kicking over the line and Clarke kicking out to the center of the field. Washington made occasional yardage, but ran against a stone wall when they tried three times to get the ball over the line eight yards for a touchdown. Clarke kicked to the 45 yard line. Washington tore up the left side of the Oregon line for 16 yards, Babcock skirted the other end for 20 yards, and three hard bucks put the ball over the line. Washington 5, Oregon 0. Goal missed.

Clarke kicked off. Eakin was forced to kick by the good work of Kiltz, and Clarke brought the grandstand to its feet by a spectacular return run. A short kick gave Coyle the ball. The visitors made 28 yards on straight football. Forced by a penalty to kick, and receiving Clarke's return, the players of the purple and gold found their fake end run not too difficult to be solved by Means. Oregon made yardage once but the ball went over and a cle-
