Aspirants for Interstate Debate Teams Will use Portland Library During Holidays

Portland City Library will be the favorite haunt of candidates for interstate debate in the interim between the two Portland games. Mr. Eliot, Oregon's coach, has written to the library, requesting that all material on the income tax be segregated and placed in one alcove where it can be easily found and readily assimilated by the college men. He has received a reply from the librarian stating that his request has been complied with. Students should make themselves known to Miss Rockwell at the reference desk. She will show them every possible courtesy.

In order to keep results in uniform shape, it has been ruled that each candidate, in preparing for the tryout, use the card index system. It is not necessary to buy a filing case, simply cards, four inches by six inches in size and to keep the results of reading on them in legible and intelligible form. Each card should show clearly and fully the source of the excerpt which it bears. All quotations should be indicated, and paraphrases or original matter placed in brackets to identify it.

In this way, all the material gathered for the tryouts will be available by use for the teams when they are selected. Indications point toward a large number of men in the tryout. The committee hopes for forty, as against sixteen last year. A list has been posted and signed by some of those who expect to try out. The men who signed Thursday and Friday are seventeen in number.

Sophomores Meet

Outsiders will not be invited to the sophomore class dance this year. Such was the decision at a meeting held last Thursday afternoon. Other routine business was transacted. An interesting feature of the meeting was a pointed address by one of the officers referring in terms of strong disapproval to the attitude of the editor of the Oregon Weekly in certain matters.

The decision of the class means that only students, ex-students, alumni and faculty of the University will be invited to the dance. This is in line with the suggestion recently made by the junior and senior classes.

Rooter King Loosley will announce through the columns of the Portland papers the arrangements for accommodation of the rooters at the Thanksgiving game. It is probable that a special section will be reserved for Oregon students. No definite word has come from the Multnomah Club management, ~~the nothing is known~~ for certain as yet.
