exorable characters that Oregon was destined to triumph.

The utmost good feeling prevailed on both sides, the game was clean, the officials impartial, and the Agricultural students brave in defeat.

How it Happened

After see-sawing in O. A. C. territory for the first few minutes of the game, the ball was driven by Carl Wolff, the O. A. C. fullback, into Oregon territory. It was caught by Latourette, who showed all the ability of his brother Jack, in running it back, behind good interference to the O. A. C. 45 yard line. Here Moullen tried a place kick which failed. On the kick-out an exchange of punts once more gave the ball to Latourette and the nervy little freshman quarter dodged and wormed and squirmed and ducked and wriggled his way to the fifteen yard line. A place kick was a matter of course, when Moullen was there to kick. O. A. C. 0, Oregon 4.

Neither side could make yardage on straight football, and a punting duel resulted. Clarke kicked far but high and the Oregon ends were down on every punt to down the runner. Wolff kicked somewhat further but the O. A. C. ends could not solve the Yale interference and the advantage lay therefore with Oregon. It was one of Clarke's punts, fumbled by Wolff and recovered by Dodson on the 45 yard line, which Moullen converted into the second goal. O. A. C. 0, Oregon 8.

The second half has been described in detail in the Portland papers. It was a fierce contest without score.

Victory in Second Half

James kicked off for the club. Latourette came back 20 yards, then on first down made a forward pass to Dodson for 20 more. Punts were interchanged. Multnomah played fiercely, Dow Walker going through the line for 20 yards. But the effort could not last. Slowly the superiority of the Oregon team evidenced itself. Latourette was hurt and Chandler went in, Hickson replacing Kiltz. Clark gained on every punt, until at last Stott fell on the ball on Multnomah's two yard line. The ball was brought in ten yards to allow Stott to kick. Means blocked the kick, and got the ball. On the next play the ball was fumbled but Means fell on it behind the line. Moullen kicked goal. M. A. A. C. 0, Oregon 6.

Clarke at once resumed the kicking game. Good tackling by the Oregon ends and a run by Sullivan put the ball in the center of the field. Moullen made a kick from placement on the 42 yard line. M. A. A. C. 0, Oregon 10.

Clarke then went out of the game, as he had been injured. Moullen went in at full and electrified the audience by a thrilling fake place kick just as the game closed.
