Twelve Seniors Study Masonry

"Masonry" is the name of a new advanced course in the department of civil and mechanical engineering. The course is required of all students in the departments. It relates especially to the construction of foundations, dams, abutments and other cement and stone work. Seven hours a week is consumed, one hour recitation and two laboratory periods, the first in testing the strength of stone, brick and cements, and the second in drafting. Mathematics does not enter largely into the course. Practical study is made of the relation of the composition and the strength of different kinds of masonry. The testing machine in the government station is used once a week. Materials are mixed by the students themselves, who later plot the results in the drafting room. Twelve seniors is the present enrollment of the class. Prof. E. H. McAlister, dean of the College of Engineering, has direct personal supervision of the new course.

Freshmen Disregard Resolutions

Outsiders will be asked to the Freshman Dance. This was decided at rather a stormy session of the class of 1912 on Thursday afternoon. Resolutions previously passed by the senior, junior and sophomore classes favoring invitation of outside people to the Junior Prom only, were disregarded by the self-sufficient neophytes. The meeting was a stormy one, and radical sentiment won the ascendancy.

Invitations to the dance are to be issued and upon payment of class tax, each freshman will receive one invitation, which he may send to a person not a student or alumnus of the University.

Complete control of all arrangements for the dance was placed in the hands of the governing board of the freshman class. This eliminates the necessity of many committees and the general misunderstanding that usually accompanies such an undertaking.

Students Devise Calendar

A. S. Trew, '09, and Willis Le Masters, ex-'10, are the editors of a unique Oregon calendar which will appear on Thursday. Proof shows six pages, each containing two calendar months of the year 1909, and each decorated with clever cartoons appropriate to the season from the pen of Le Masters.

Splendid cuts of the fraternity houses and dormitories, and of men high in University councils enliven the pages. University views are interspersed, one of which is an especially fine picture of the mill race.

The calendar will be printed on cardboard with the Oregon seal on the cover, and will be tied in the college colors. Similar calendars appear annually at the larger colleges. This is the first one to be devised for the University of Oregon.
