Lyman Speaks to Girls

James K. Lyman, the Y. M. C. A. secretary, addressed the Y. W. C. A. Tuesday on the subject of "Friendship with God." He read the story of the three temptations of Jesus, as recorded in Matthew. He said in part:

"Jesus Christ grew up as an ordinary boy and probably up to the time of his baptism did not know that he was to bring God's message to the Jewish people. But when he was baptised by John the Baptist, the Holy Spirit descended upon him and he knew immediately that he was the chosen one of God, the second law-giver to the Jewish people, whose coming he had read about in the Scriptures. Now he felt the overwhelming presence of God and knew that all power was in his hands. He began to look about him for a means by which he might remedy the evils of the chosen people of God. He knew that he could hurl himself from the temple and people would flock to him; he knew that he could turn bread into stones and feed the hungry; he knew that he could make himself a world leader, the head of a great nation—but he also knew that none of these things would solve the problem.

"He decided that the only way to redeem men was to bring them into a personal relation with God, to show them how to be friends with him. We grow to be like our friends, we study their likes and dislikes, we love them and make sacrifices for them. This is what we should do for God and this is the most important thing in our lives because it is this friendship which enables us to attain to the highest in this life. The cultivation of this friendship lies in admitting our sins, in finding out what Jesus loved and consecrated his life to, in studying the word, in associating with Christian people and in helping others."
