Laureans Debate big Question

Unusual interest was shown at the meeting of the Laurean Literary Society on Friday night at which the question for the interstate debate was discussed. The question was "Resolved, That waiving constitutionality the Federal government should impose a progressive tax upon all incomes above a certain amount." Williams, Collier and Gammans spoke for the affirmative while Bond, Lyans and Steele maintained the negative. The affirmative argued that the present Federal system of revenue is in need of revision and that the income tax should be introduced to make the system more just and elastic. The negative maintained that such a tax would mean duplicity of taxation, that the tax could not be successfully levied and that if imposed at all it should be levied by the state and local governments. The decision was rendered in favor of the affirmative.

Reconsideration of the motion to exclude outsiders from the Freshman Glee resulted in the passage of the motion at freshman class meeting last week. A stuffed ballot box is alleged, however, and another meeting may be necessary to ascertain the will of the class.
