## FRESHMAN TEAM WINS RACE

Junior Captain Finishes First, but Underclassmen win Enough Points to Secure Victory

George X. Riddell, '10, finished first in the three-mile cross country race on Friday afternoon. The juniors, although their captain finished first, won only second place in number of points, the freshmen taking first place by having men finish second, third, fourth, tenth and seventeenth. The sophomores were third and the seniors last. The three mile course was run in the rain and mud in fifteen minutes and twenty seconds, better time than that of Sievers, '11, last year by a minute and a half. By the system of scoring, the first man in counted twenty points for his class; the second man made nineteen points; the third man, eighteen; and so on, until the last man was credited with only one point. The course was from the grandstand on Kincaid field, out on Thirteenth and on Alder to the Masonic Cemetery, back on the carline on University Avenue, then once around the running track.

The men will not cease training after this race, but will try to keep in shape for prospective intercollegiate contests. The most important of these is one that may be arranged with O. A. C. to be run some time in February. Distance running has always been the strong feature of O. A. C. track work, and Oregon has seldom been able to win even a handy second. Last year was an exception and the present year bids fair to prove another, from the showing of the men on Saturday.

Riddell is distinctly a find in track work. Although urged to train in the past he never did so, not believing himself capable of going in fast company. But this season he was induced to don the spikes and has made good. He will probably try for the mile run in the spring.
