Instead of having but one debating society where membership was hardly great enough to afford good varied programmes, there should be at least two societies, when the work could be carried on in competition and better programmes, rendered with fine enthusiasm, would be the result. The Y. W. C. A. has been successful in a small way, but it is not the live factor in college life here as it is in most of the other Western Universities. At one time, when the student-body was small a good glee club—The Treble Clef Club—flourished. Now that the student-body is so much larger, there should surely be enough material here to make a glee club for girls profitable. The oratorios, last Spring, proved that we have the material. In the past there has been no place for the girls to do good consistent work in athletics. Through the increased appropriation such a place will probably be provided and with more tennis courts should go far toward building up athletic teams of different kinds. Too often women come to college, spend the whole four years here and then go away having gained much and given nothing. As soon as we can get away from the individualistic, the selfish idea of doing all for ourselves, the better it will be for us all. Let every woman give as much of her time and energy as possible in some line of work that will benefit all the women of the university. Then and then only, will women have a definite place upon the campus and the full meaning of the term co-education come into its own.
