A New Industry added to Chemawa.



Chemawa's new and up-to-date Poultry Yard is now in full blast and Mr. Overman is the happy manager of the same.

As yet we give a cut taken from file of a couple of our prize Plymouth Rock birds. We have two varieties, the Plymouth Rock and White Wyandotte, and two yards of each variety.

The house, planned by Mr. Overman and built by Mr. Woods and his carpenter boys, is 18x60 ft., two stories high, and is arranged for 6 yards. It is as nicely venetian proof as can be made. It is a pretty sight to see the thoroughbreds at work in their scratching bins and Mr. Overman among them handling them like so many mill-draw.

The up stairs is arranged for the old ducks and their little peeps. The entire house has been white-washed and as much as weather permits, the boxes of the yards will be similarly treated.
