At 5 p. m. in spite of lowering clouds and Oregon mist the Allied Express brought out from Salem more than one-hundred additional visitors to witness the graduating exercises held in the school chapel. At 7:30 p. m. the large chapel was filled and many were obliged to stand from lack of room, there being three-hundred fifty visitors from Salem. As the rich notes of the professional march as played by Miss Lottie Lane of the Junior class filled the room.

The graduating class composed of four young women looking very dainty in their pretty white gowns, and twelve young men in neat black suits marched slowly down the aisle imitated the steps and took their places reserved for them on the platform facing the audience. Opposite the class sat Supt. Potter, Gov. and Mrs. Gov. Vice President and Mrs. Hawley of Willamette University, several of the clergy from Salem and others.
