**RAILROAD RATES.**

Certificates of attendance will be distributed at the meetings, enabling employees of Government schools to claim pay for the time necessarily consumed in going to, and returning from, the meeting, and in attendance thereon. Unless these certificates are secured and promptly turned over to the Agents or Superintendents for transmission to the Indian Office, pay for the time consumed will not be allowed.

**AMUSEMENTS.**
