BENEFIT OREGON INDIANS.

More Brick Buildings at Chemawa School.

Washington, Jan. 16.—An amendment
to the Indian appropriation bill has been
offered by Senator Mitchell, providing for
new buildings at the Chemawa school, as
follows: Brick auditorium, \$15,000; brick
hospital, \$12,000; building for employes,
\$2,500.

The amendment also provides for the
ratification of the treaty with the Klamath
Indians, and the payment to them of
\$537,007 for lands which they are to relin-
quish to the government. After the pay-
ment of just debts from this fund, the
balance, together with \$350,000 shall be paid
to the Indians, or expended for their benefit
by the Secretary of the Interior, payments
not to exceed 10 per cent of the fund per-
annum.—[Capital Journal.]
