The World's Largest Ship.

In the presence of an immense crowd and saluted by whistles from factories and cheers of thousands of throats the MINNESOTA, the biggest freight carrying vessel in the world was launched recently at New London, Conn. The MINNESOTA can stow away in her cavernous hold 28,000 tons dead weight, and in her superstructure, reserved for passengers, she can carry nearly 2,700 persons, including 172 first cabin, 110 second cabin and 68 third cabin voyagers. As a transport she could accommodate ten regiments. Her dimensions are: Length 630 ft., breadth 73½ moulded, depth 56 ft. Her great depth and frame enables her to beat the world as a carrier. She was not built for speed. Her triple expansion engine, turning twin propellers 20 ft. in diameter, are intended to drive her at the rate of 14 knots in pleasant weather.—The Christian Herald.
