Therefore, in view of the dilapidated condition of the present school buildings, it has been determined to expend during the coming summer from \$25,000 to \$30,000 in the erection of new buildings of sufficient capacity to accommodate 125 pupils, all that are now in need of schooling. Under no circumstances will the department consider the building up of a non-reservation school at Puyallup, as has long been advocated by Senator Foster Superintendent Terry and others.—Chiloeco Farmer.
