Among Other Schools.

From the Chilocco Farmer:

We have 300 acres of corn planted and growing. The last frosts, however, have damaged our first planting so that part of it had to be replanted.

We have set out thousands and thousands of sweet potatoes and tomatoes and still have other thousands coming on to set out.

Charles Taylor, a Kaw Indian citizen, and his family, have been allotted 3,200 acres of land. In three years this land should be worth \$70,000.

The Oklahoma Iowas have a quilt five feet square which is made from 70 scalps, red, white and kinky, said to have been in the tribe for 150 years. It is considered a cure-all for and preventive of all ills.

Supt. McCowan has received notification from the Indian Office of his appointment as Charge-de-Affairs of the government Indian exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, and that \$40,000, the sum appropriated by Congress for that purpose, will be at his disposal.

Hon. Chas. Curtis, of Kansas, who is the only member of Congress who is an Indian, has been allotted 1600 acres of the Kaw lands for himself and family.

Two thousand six hundred twenty-two gallons of milk were received from the dairy during the third quarter.

Our spring vacation began the fifth of may and a great deal of urgent work is being done and many needed improvements made.
