PROPOSALS FOR WOOD:

SEALED PROPOSALS, endorsed "proposals for wood", and addressed to the undersigned at Chemawa, Oregon, will be received at this school until two o'clock p. m., of Tuesday, July 7, 1903, for furnishing and delivering at this school as required during the fiscal year June 30, 1904, 2,000 cords of woods, per specifications and instructions to bidders obtainable at the school. Bidders must state specifically in their bids the proposed price per cord of the wood to be offered for delivery under contract. The wood so offered will be subject to rigid inspection. The right reserved to reject any and all bids, or any part of any bid, if deemed for the best interests of the services. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or draft upon some United States Depository or solvent National Bank, made payable to the order of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, for at least five per cent of the amount of the proposal, which check or drafts will be forfeited to the United States in case any bidder or bidders receiving any award shall fail to execute promptly a contract with good and sufficient sureties in accordance with his bid, otherwise to be retained to the bidder. Bids accompanied by cash in lieu of certified check will not be considered.
