In the Garden.

During the week ending Tuesday, June 23, the gardeners supplied 40 bushels of lettuce, 32 bushels of onions and 437 gallons of strawberries, besides various other vegetables. The strawberry plants are yet young and consequently not at their best for yielding, although in splendid condition. Twenty bushels of rhubarb was sent to the dining hall on Monday and on Tuesday 15 bushels of green peas, the first of the season, were sent in.

Seven acres of late potatoes were planted this week, and the remaining five acres will be planted at once. A total of about 30 acres will be put into potatoes this season. This will undoubtedly supply the school for the entire year. The monthly consumption is about 300 bushels.

The fences surrounding the garden and orchard were whitewashed this week, and the boys are now giving the fruit trees a coat of the same material.
