"The baseball game in the afternoon between the Chemawa Indians and Wasco team drew the attention of the throng which had been attracted by the largest excursion that ever left Hood River on one day, and another large one from Wasco. Fully 2000 people filled the grounds of the B. & C. Club Field to witness the game, which resulted to a score of 3 to 0 in favor of Chemawa. The chief feature of the game was the superb pitching of Morris, of the Chemawas, whose curve was mysterious to the opposing team."

The fact that Chemawa was short two players and had to depend on two strangers as substitutes created considerable enthusiasm among the Wasco fans and an easy victory seemed certain from their point of view. However, we are sorry to say, their enthusiasm proved a very expensive luxury to the over-zealous. This is the third time that the pride of Wasco has fallen a victim to the superior playing of the Chemawa braves.
