Mrs. Anna I. Winston has resigned as assistant matron at the Carson school and returned to her home in Seattle.

The Carson Indian School has contracted with a lumber firm for \$1,500 worth of lumber which will be used for improvements and repairs about the school.

Moses Summers has been appointed shoemaker and bandmaster at Cheyenne Agency, S. D. Summers must have received a hearty welcome there as the ground is already covered with snow.

Mrs. M. C. Williams, at one time a teacher here, and later superintendent first of the Shawnee, then of the Pottawatomie school, is now assistant principal in the Albuquerque Indian School.—Indian Leader.

The Regina school, Canada, purchased a steam threshing machine this year and in doing threshing for neighboring farmers, have found it a paying investment. This school is supported by the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

Mrs. Moses King has been appointed assistant seamstress at the Cheyenne agency, South Dakota. She writes that they had snow there on September 13. She said: "It snowed quite hard and soon everything was covered with snow. The trees along the creek looked so pretty all covered with snow and the green leaves sticking out. * * * Moses Summers came here the twelfth to be shoemaker and bandmaster.—Indian Leader.
