Chemawa's Charles Cutter

The Portland Telegram in a write up of one the social and musical events of the past week had the following to say of our Charles Cutter:

A feature of the evening was a solo by "Charlie Cutter," the Alaska Indian. None of the conventional adjectives will describe the quality of his voice. It filled the church and gave you the impression that it could fill all our doors just as easily.

There is in the voice of a timbre peculiar vibrant quality that must be due to his race and his early environment. It brings to mind illimitable distances, inhospitable solitudes, the elemental savagery of a great, wild land and a great, wild people.

Let us hope he will keep that distinctive quality and not become just like the mob of trained men vocalizers. He ought to spend three months of every year a-soak, soul and sense, in his native environment.
