PROPOSALS FOR HORSES. Chemawa, Oregon, May 31, 1906. SEALED PROPOSALS, plainly marked on the outside of the sealed envelope "Proposals for Horses" and addressed to the undersigned at Chemawa, Oregon, will be received at the Indian School until two o'clock p. m. of June 22, 1906, for furnishing and delivering at the school six young, sound and serviceable horses or mares, weighing not less than 250 pounds each, as per full specifications obtainable at the school. Bidders must state in their bids the proposed price of each animal to be offered under contract and all animals so offered will be subject to rigid inspection. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids or any part of any bid if deemed for the best interest of the Service. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or draft upon some United States depository or solvent National bank, made payable to the order of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, for at least five per cent of the amount of the proposals, which check or draft shall be forfeited to the United States in case a bidder receiving an award shall fail to execute promptly a satisfactory contract in accordance with his bid; otherwise to be returned to the bidder.
