A snappy and interesting game of base ball between Lapwai Indian School and the first team of Gifford, Idaho, was played on the Lapwai School grounds on Saturday June the 16th, an account of which is given below.

The game was called immediately upon the arrival of the Gifford team at 3:30 p. m. Neither side scored in the first. The visitors secured one run in the second and another in the sixth, shutting out the home team up to the eighth, when the Lapwai boys rallied securing a run in the eighth and another in the ninth thus tying the score. The visitors scored one more run in the tenth but the home team secured two with only one man down, winning the game with a final score of three to four in favor of the Indian School team.

The features of the game were the pitching of Harry Moffet for the home team and the one handed catch of David Thomas of a fly ball over his head while running in the same direction as the ball. Spectators who have witnessed hundreds of games of base ball were heard to remark that the game here was the prettiest ever seen. This is the second game lost by the Gifford team out of a series of about twenty. The home boys had the advantage in securing the greatest number of hits while the visiting team were ahead in base running.
