

The three conditions of life-service in the world are, first, be happy yourself, second, learn how much unhappiness there is in the world and third, be faithful in your helpfulness.

I suppose this occasion was planned especially for the graduating class; so I will speak just a word to them.

Some years ago, President Roosevelt was addressing a graduating class at Berkeley, California. I have never seen the exact words of the address; but he said something like this: He reminded the students that the State had given them their education. He appealed to their sense of honor. He said if anyone receives some great benefit, it is taken for granted that he will make some return. We would not think of going to the store and getting things and not paying for them. He intimated that it was some sort of thievery or base "graft," if these students had received their education at the hands of the State and did not feel some obligation. The State does not come to the students and merely suggest that they do something for the State. The State rightly demands of every child whom it educates, it demands payment in citizenship and general helpfulness.

So, young friends, graduating from this school, I beg of you, if the school has given you anything for which in any way, you feel grateful, that you will strive to "make good," try to live so that you will be an example of true manhood and true womanhood. Be happy yourselves. Cultivate happy ways. Do not grieve unreasonably. Create happiness about you. I advise anyone who feels unhappy, even to pretend to be happy and in some way, that will act backwards on you. This is a law of psychology. It will act back on you. Use your will. Give your heart to God because such

confidence makes for rest and peace and happiness. You will go forth to life. Each one of you may have your personal troubles, your sorrows. Do not give your hearts wholly to these sadnesses. Adopt the motto of Christ. Say for yourselves, "I am not here for what there is in it for me but for what I can give to the world." Have a passionate desire to be of some service in the world. Thousands of people are born into this world every hour, and every hour, thousands pass away. We are between the two mysteries of birth and death; and so it has been for all the years. We may share with our Father the work of this world and have the great satisfaction of being companions with Him in his work. Do not be one of those who spread unhappiness everywhere but be companions of those who have "counted that day lost whose low descending sun views from their hands no noble action done."
