A dispatch from Abington, Pa. to the Philadelphia newspapers, and dated the 17th inst., contains the following regarding the marriage of Frank Jude, the famous Indian foot ball and base ball player of the Carlisle school:

"A romance that had its inception at the Carlisle Indian school culminated here this evening at the home of Assemblyman Charles A. Ambler, when Frank Jude and Miss Daisy Dyke, both full-blooded Indians, were quietly married in the presence of a few friends of Mr. and Mrs. Ambler. Mr Jude, the bridegroom, is the star right-fielder of the Cincinnati National League baseball team.

"The ceremony was performed at 7 p. m. in the parlor of the Ambler home by Rev. James W. Williams, pastor of the Abington Presbyterian Church. The bridegroom entered the Carlisle Indian school from the White Earth Reservation in Minnesota ten years ago. Coupled with his ability as a ball player is a brilliant record on the gridiron, he having played end on the Carlisle football for several years. Miss Dyke is a Californian, and has been at the Carlisle school for about five years."

Jude is well known to the Carlisle people, and played for two years on Carlisle amateur teams. He also worked in Carlisle printing offices.—Carlisle Herald.
