Sealed proposals plainly marked on the outside of the sealed envelope "PROPOSALS FOR FLOUR" and addressed to the undersigned at Chemawa, Oregon, will be received at the Indian School until two o'clock p. m. Saturday December 8, 1906, for furnishing and delivering at the school as required during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1907, about 150000 pounds of flour, as per specification obtainable at the school. Bidders should state the price per hundredweight for the flour delivered at the school, the flour to be subject to rigid inspection. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids, or any part of any bid, if deemed for the best interests of the service. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or draft upon some United States depository or solvent national bank, made payable to the order of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, for at least five per cent of the amount of the bid, which check or draft shall be forfeited to the United States in case any bidder receiving an award shall fail to execute promptly a satisfactory contract in accordance with the terms of his bid; otherwise to be returned to bidder.
