Supervisor M. F. Holland arrived in Pheonix on Wednesday from Maricopa. He has lately visited Sacaton and San Carlos. It is several years since Mr. Holland had visited the largest school in his district and he notes "something doing" on the premises as well as numerous changes among the instructors.

Inspector McLaughlin is at Rosebud Agency again conferring with the Indians relative to the opening for settlement that part of the reservation lying in Tripp County. Congressman Burke recently introduced a bill providing for this settlement, but the Indians seem to be holding the land at a higher price than the department is willing to give them.

At the Industrial cottage the little porch kitchen has been torn down. A substantial kitchen is being built. An additional bathroom is being constructed on the east side, and the whole house inside has been painted and made like new.

Friday night was one of the coldest and most disagreeable of the winter. The thermometer stood 18 degrees below zero with a fierce gale from the northwest, the air was filled with drifting snow and the result was frozen water pipes in many of the buildings.—Weekly Review.

Among the 300 children enrolled the past year, six tribes are represented, the Piutes being greatly in the ascendancy, numbering 185. The Washoes rank next in number, having an enrollment of 75. There are 21 Shoshonis here. The Pitt River, Digger and Cherokees constitutes the remainder of the school and have about equal numbers enrolled.—New Indian.
