PROPOSALS FOR WOOD AND COAL, CHEMAWA, OREGON, MARCH 8, 1907. Sealed proposals, plainly marked on the outside of two sealed envelopes, "PROPOSALS FOR WOOD OR COAL," as the case may be, addressed to the undersigned at Chemawa, Oregon, will be received at the Indian School until two o'clock P. M. APRIL 8, 1907, for furnishing and delivering at the school as may be required during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1908, about 2000 cords of wood and 1200 tons of coal, as per specifications and full information to be obtained at the school. Each bidder must state specifically in his bid the price of wood or coal, per cord or ton as the case may be, offered under contract. The fuel so offered will be subject to rigid inspection. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids on any part of any bid if deemed for the best interests of the service. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or draft upon some United States depository or solvent national bank, made payable to the order of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, for at least 5 per cent of the amount of such bid, which check or draft shall be forfeited to the United States in case any bidder refusing an award shall fail to execute promptly a satisfactory contract in accordance with the terms of his bid; otherwise to be returned to bidder.
