The first game was played at Chemawa and was won by the Indians 24 to 17. The second at Albina resulted in a victory for the Albina 25 to 23. The game last night was won by the redmen 20 to 12. The first half ended with honors nearly even the score being 9 to 8 in favor of the home team. In the second half the superior teamwork and wind of the Indians resulted in a credit of 11 points, while their opponents secured only 4.
