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Was a good and useful Indian

Last Sunday April 7, a telegram was received here which announced the sudden death of Thos. Flood. He was at Sioux Falls, S. D., acting as interpreter for the U. S. Court. He retired on Saturday night, and in the morning some of his friends went to his room and found him dead. It seems by report that he died with heart-failure. He was brought back to Rosebud on the 10th and was buried at St. Francis' Mission on the 11th. Thos. Flood was noted as one of the best interpreters on the reservation. He has interpreted for nearly every treaty the Government has made with the Indians. He was connected with the allotting outfit which was allotting to the Indians here several years ago and he knew every allotment by heart. He was well respected by both white people and Indians. Our heart felt sympathy is extended to the family.

Bids opened on the first of April for inherited Indian Lands, shows the Rosebud lands are in great demand. One piece

of land sold for \$3,767.
