### The Weekly Review.

Chas. D. Wheelock, of Oneida, Wis., died recently at Shoshoni School, Wyo., of meningitis, after a short illness of only four days.

It is reported that Mr. Jesse McCallum harness maker at the Genoa School is dead. Mr. McCallum has been a valued employe at Genoa for a long term of years and his death will be a great loss to Genoa.

Supt. Arthur E. McFatridge of Winnebago has been transferred to Umatilla Agency, Oregon. The change is a promotion for Mr. McFatridge, and increase of two hundred dollars per annum in salary.

Supt. S. M. McCowan of Chilocco is at Chicago receiving treatment for a chronic case of appendicitis.

Special Agent Thomas Downs in charge of Cheyenne River Agency has been at Fort Mead arranging for the removal of the Utes to the land recently leased from the Cheyennes. It is expected that the Utes will move about June the tenth.

A charter has been granted for the first railroad that will have an Indian for its president. The road is the Indian Central railway, to be built from Ponca City, Oklahoma, to Paris, Texas, 460 miles.

### Nebraska State Journal.

The Osage Indian boarding school for boys, situated across the line from here, in Oklahoma, was destroyed by fire today. The loss is \$75,000. As far as known all the inmates escaped safely. The school was built in 1780, and was one of the oldest landmarks on the Osage reservation.

**PROPOSALS FOR FISH,** Chemawa, Oregon, May 14, 1907. Sealed proposals, plainly marked on the outside of the envelope "PROPOSALS FOR FISH," and addressed to the undersigned at Chemawa, Oregon, will be received at the Indian School until 2 o'clock, P. M., Saturday June 8, 1907, inviting proposals for furnishings and delivering at the school, as required during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1908, about twenty-six thousand (26,000) pounds of fish, as per specifications obtainable at the school. Bidders must state in their bid the price of the fish per pound. The fish, when delivered, shall be subject to rigid inspection. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids or any part of any bid if deemed for the best interests of the service. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or draft on some United States depository or solvent national bank, made payable to the order of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, for at least five per cent. of the bid, which check or draft shall be forfeited to the United States in case a bidder receiving an award shall fail to execute promptly a satisfactory contract in accordance with his proposal; otherwise to be returned to the bidder. Bids accompanied by cash in lieu of certified check will not be considered. For further information apply to Edwin L. Chalcraft, Superintendent.
