An Oregon Law

The following bill was past by the last Session of the Oregon legislature and is now in force:

An Act to prohibit the locating of any saloon, or place where liquor is sold at retail, within two miles of any school where tuition, food and clothing are furnished at the expense of the United States.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful hereafter for any person, firm, or corporation, to locate any saloon, or offer to sell, or give away any liquor, within two miles of any school erected and maintained within the State of Oregon by the Government of the United States, where

tuition, lodging, food and clothing are furnished at the expense of the United States.

Section 2. No person shall be permitted to sell spiritous, malt or vinous liquors, or fermented cider, commonly known as hard cider, within two miles of any school erected and maintained, within the State of Oregon, by the Government of the United States, where tuition, lodging, food and clothing are furnished at the expense of the United States; and in no case shall a license be granted for such sales within the distance of two miles from said school.

Section 3. Any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be fined in a sum of not less than \$100, or not more than \$500, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than two months or more than six months.

Section 4. Justices of the peace shall have concurrent jurisdiction in all violations of this Act.
