On the morning of the race the Indians supplied the Y. M. C. A. men, as well as their own, with a schedule of instructions, and altogether proved how superior was their organization.

Many of the Y. M. C. A. men had great difficulty in reaching their positions by car and on foot, and it was only by the courtesy of Henry Hewitt with a 2:40 trotter and buggy that Lau, the Oswego relay, was able to get to his post at all. Lack of interest taken by the ruling powers of the association and no contributions in the matter of funds is what the runners charge the association officials with.
