

MR. TEABO'S LECTURE.

The industrial lecture Monday evening was delivered by Mr. J. M. Teabo on the subject of "baking." He spoke of the difference of methods used in the baking at home in the stove ovens, and that used by bakeries, stating that 100 loaves can be handled in the bakery as easy as two by home baking.

The Chemawa bakery turns out 3,000 loaves a week. Mr. Teabo will have 1,000 loaves on hand for Christmas.

He said that it was very essential that boys should learn the baker's trade, and that the ladies understand more about slicing and preparing of bread and cakes for the table. They should be cut into dainty transparent pieces; also how to place it on the plate. He called attention to the kind of clothes bakers should wear and the great importance of being neat and clean. He spoke of the different grades of flour and the many ways of making pastry.

He explained how the oven is operated and how the bread is placed in the oven and removed by the teel. Mr. Teabo closed his interesting lecture by telling how the 600 pounds of Turkey was roasted for the Christmas dinner.
